

Mission & Objectives

- To conserve and protect the unique natural environment, ecosystems and biodiversity of the eastern and northern coastlines of Georgian Bay in perpetuity while supporting sustainable communities.
- 1. Preserve the natural and cultural heritage of the region.
- Develop a discussion paper to review current conservation plans + the threats, gaps and opportunities to strengthen protection of the area.
- 3. Identify the important principles to guide conservation plans, protection of lands & waters.
- 4. Engage governments, First Nations, communities & NGOs to develop a consensus on a vision and actions for enhanced protection.
- 5. Expand natural and environmentally valuable protected areas.



Stakeholder Engagement & Coalition Building

- **Extensive outreach** to engage communities and stakeholders.
- Collaborating with major partners to align goals and priorities.
- **❖ Two rounds of consultations** with stakeholders in phase 1:
 - 1) Collect input to inform the discussion paper
 - 2) Discussion of the paper's content and proposals
- Developing a coalition for conservation of stakeholders to present a stronger voice to governments.





First Nations Engagement

- First Nations play an important role in the wider Georgian Bay region. Their deep connections to the land and water are central to the area's history, culture, and future.
- ❖ Indigenous communities bring valuable traditional knowledge and stewardship practices that are important to conservation.
- First Nations hold sovereign jurisdiction over their reserves. Their inclusion in any conservation strategy must be rooted in mutual respect, shared values, and jointly established principles of stewardship.
- Collaborating with partners to identify respectful and effective ways to engage Indigenous communities.
